ACADEMICS

- The Freeport School District was honored to welcome NASA chief technologist and Cornell University professor Dr. Mason Peck to Freeport High School. Dr. Peck spent the morning enjoying breakfast with students, staff and administrators in the school's DLC, where students presented their research projects and had the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to receive his professional feedback. Dr. Peck also gifted students with NASA pins. After the presentation of the student research, Dr. Peck was greeted by hundreds of students from across the district as he entered the school's performing arts center, where he presented his keynote address on the CubeSat project.
- The High School was boasting with accomplishment, as 85 students were inducted as new members of the National Honor Society in a special candle lighting ceremony. With families and friends in attendance, the students took an oath to upstand the pillars of the National Honor Society and continue to serve themselves and their community.
- Leo F. Giblyn Elementary School second grade dual-language students and their parents worked together on a Thanksgiving themed STEAM challenge. ATHLETICS

- The Red Devils varsity football team are the reigning Long Island Conference I Champions, after defeating the William Floyd Colonials in an intense, action packed game, 42-14, at Stony Brook University's LaValle Stadium. This is Freeport's seventh Long Island Championship win. They continued their undefeated winning streak this season, with a total of 24 consecutive victories since 2018, and also claimed the Nassau County Conference 1 title, after defeating the Farmingdale Dalers 30-7.
- The high school gymnasium was filled with proud parents, district staff, administrators
 and members of the board of education, as the school's Navy Junior ROTC held its annual
 Inspection and Battalion Parade. This year's membership has climbed to 248 members,
 with last year's company consisting of 220 members. Students passed their inspection
 with flying colors, which was conducted by retired U.S. Navy Commander and NJROTC
 Area Four Manager Jimmie Miller.
