ACADEMICS

- District students sharpened their skills in space engineering this summer by beginning to design a prototype and utilize a three-dimensional printer to construct a CubeSat that will carry an experiment NASA will launch into outer space. This project became a reality when the district was awarded the prestigious NASA/New York Space grant. Freeport is the third public school district in New York State to win this grant and the first school district on Long Island.
- Freeport High School seniors Rosa Medina, Ryan Strong and Travell White (Class of 2020) ventured to Brookhaven National Laboratory and participated in its prestigious High School Science Research program over the summer.
- Freeport's Atkinson School was teeming with fresh opportunities, as district administrators and board of education members welcomed its new staff during the annual First Year Teachers' Orientation. Fourteen new teachers were distributed Chromebooks to kick off the multi-day orientation and were eager to start their new journey at Freeport.
- Freeport High School was a sea of smiles as teachers, staff, Board of Education members and administrators came together for the annual Superintendent's Conference Day. Before everyone broke off into individual building sessions, the entire staff gathered in the Performing Arts Center to celebrate the start of the school year with an inspiring message from Superintendent of Schools Dr. Kishore Kuncham.
- Freeport district administration, staff, and Board of Education members welcomed Colonel Anselmo Brandao, general commander of the State of Bahia Police in Brazil, and discussed useful techniques in reducing stress and improving mental health. Also attending the meeting was Colonel Brandao's team of experts, representatives from Nassau County and Freeport Village, Nassau County Police Department Assistant Commissioner Marianela Casas and Freeport Village Assistant Chief of Police Ray Horton.

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- Fifty-three current students and alumni from Freeport High School have earned the designation of Advanced Placement Scholars for excelling on the 2019 AP exams. The district has continued to see an increase in the number of AP Scholars throughout the years. Graduated senior Saif Ali earned the National AP Scholar designation, which is the highest designation one can achieve. Saif also earned AP Scholar with Distinction, along with nine other students. In addition, eight students were named AP Scholars with Honor and 35 were designated as AP Scholars.
- Bayview Avenue School's third grade students were eager to be paired up with members of the Freeport Fire Department for the school's 14th annual Hooked on Firefighters Kickoff. Five classes were assigned to firefighters, who educated students on fire safety through a simulated smokehouse and fire truck demonstrations.
- Columbus Avenue School was filled with excitement for the school's Parent University
 Event, Leap into Kindergarten. Students and their parents enjoyed a night of fun
 interactive learning experiences, including early literacy skills, mindfulness and
 math.
- New Visions School hosted a fiesta for Hispanic Heritage month, where staff and fourth grade students in Ms. Tiffany Grimes and Ms. Dianna Lanzetta's class brought in a variety of Hispanic dishes to sample.
