## ACADEMICS

- Bayview Avenue School hosted its first Black History Museum, where kindergarten to fourth-grade students went on an African-American history quest and participated in hands-on activities with items on display.
- Third-grade dual-language classes at Archer Street School participated in an exciting, hands-on video conference with science instructors from the Cleveland Museum of Natural History. The focus of the lesson was on forces and motion, with the classroom converted into a high-action lab ruled by the laws of motion.
- Dodd Middle School had the honor of hosting Long Island author Jennifer Wolf Kam, when eighth-grade students were given a special opportunity to participate in a writer's workshop.
- The Caroline G. Representing Freeport were students from Atkinson, Dodd Middle School and Freeport High School. Between the three schools, students won six awards.
