POINTS OF PRIDE DECEMBER 2017

ACADEMICS

- The district had its proposal to introduce nanotechnology into the high school curriculum accepted by Brookhaven National Laboratory's Center for Functional Nanomaterials for the second consecutive year. Freeport is the only district on Long Island to have an approved user project at the CFN. As a result of the proposal's acceptance, Freeport High School science research instructor Edward Irwin has, for the second consecutive year, earned the honor of visiting BNL to characterize the nanoparticles he and his students will have synthesized in the high school classroom setting.
- Following the award of a \$600,000 My Brother's Keeper Initiative Grant, the district has created a series of programs by implementing the Family and Community Engagement Program funded by this grant. The program is designed to raise the level of engagement among families of male students of color.
- Archer, Atkinson, Bayview, Giblyn and New Visions hosted Discovery Day for their students, featuring a slate of various activities related to astronomy and the mission of the International Space Station and incorporating the STEAM lessons taught in the classroom. Discovery Day prepared students for a unique opportunity later in the year, as they will attempt a video and audio connection with the astronauts aboard the International Space Station. Freeport is the only district in the nation to have been awarded that opportunity.
- The 236 members of Freeport High School's Navy Junior ROTC had their commitment and discipline on full display at the annual Inspection and Battalion Parade before the Board of Education, administrators, Village of Freeport trustees, local war veterans and families.
- Students at Freeport High School experienced augmented reality by participating in the Google Expeditions Pioneer Program.
- As part of a 10-year annual tradition, students at Freeport High School hosted 18 foreign exchange students from Germany and led them through a variety of fun and educational activities during their stay.
- Students at Atkinson worked with their families on engaging and interactive STEM activities as part of STEM Night.

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- Students from Adelphi University led STEM activities and workshops for students and their families at the annual Bayview/Giblyn STEM Night.
- New Visions hosted DeSTEMber Night, featuring holiday-themed STEM activities, for third-graders and their families.
- Under the direction of their classroom teachers and librarian Christine Meloni, students at Dodd have been videoconferencing with several experts from various institutions and organizations.
- Dodd hosted a Parent University event that focused on New York State exams.
- The Dodd Mentoring Program received a grant from Mentor New York to help celebrate National Mentoring Month.
