# ACADEMICS

- The district partnered with Nassau BOCES and six other districts in a Teaching Is the Core grant. Nassau BOCES is leading the seven-district consortium through assessment review and action plan development, followed by implementation of a regional action plan resulting in an assessment inventory that both informs instruction and meets New York State APPR guidelines. The project is expected to reduce the number of assessments students must take while increasing each assessment's value to teachers and administrators as a tool to inform instruction.
- The high school hosted the year's first after-school science seminar in the Distance Learning Center, which was filled to capacity. The featured speaker was Dr. Lisa Miller, associate division director for spectroscopy and imaging in the Photon Sciences Directorate at Brookhaven National Laboratory, who spoke about Alzheimer's disease.
- As part of Coding Week at J.W. Dodd Middle School, 83 students learned about computer coding during their lunch hours through presentations led by science teachers Kristen Santamaria and Georgia Plakas.
- High school students visited J.W. Dodd Middle School as part of its Early College Awareness Breakfast to talk to students about high school and the college application process.
- Bayview Avenue hosted a Parent Academy and welcomed Long Island Parent Center Education Outreach Specialist Randy Young during parent-teacher conferences. Young provided information about Response to Intervention, including tiered-leveled support, guided reading and leveled readers.
- Archer Street hosted the district's first Science/Astro Night, during which Archer and New Visions fourth-graders participated in interactive science activities with Dr. Emily Kang and 24 undergraduate students of Adelphi University's Scholar Teacher Education Program. In addition, high school students Leah Hochmann and Rajiv Chanda spoke about their science projects to students and parents.
- Students in Archer Street's Enrichment for Leaders program are set for the grand opening of their student-run bookstore, Books for You.
