2021-22 Budget Highlights

- The district has proposed a 2021-2022 budget with no tax levy increase. In fact, it is a 0.12% decrease.
- Maintains programs, services and staffing. Provides for support for loss of schooling.

- Increases instructional technology equipment and enhances digital learning platforms.
- Includes continued support for health and safety of students and staff.
- Increases programming in Social Emotional Learning with SEL Sensory Spaces.

- Enhances support services for ENL students and students with special needs, including BOCES services.

We hope you are all doing well as we continue to move forward towards a return to normalcy following the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. Together, we remained Freeport Strong and we are now seeing hope as restrictions are being scaled back and people are able to be vaccinated. Freeport Public Schools is delighted at the success of our phased-in reopening plan that has allowed our students to flourish this year. planning process, the district was facing another reduction of State Aid based on the governor's proposed budget following a significant State Aid cut for the present year and next year. The \$1.9 trillion federal American Rescue Plan stimulus package has brought new funding to New York State, including \$9 billion for school districts. The Foundation Aid for Freeport has been partially restored, allowing for a budget proposal with no tax levy increase. We are proposing a 2021-2022 budget that maintains and enhances our current programs and services with no tax levy increase. In fact, it is a tax levy

Our building is normally open 70 hours a week, and many of our services are available 24/7 through our website. When the pandemic forced us to close the building, we continued to serve you by converting our programs to an online format, increasing access to digital materials such as databases, e-books and audiobooks and adding access to video content. When the shutdown ended, the Freeport Memorial Library

was the first library in Nassau County to reopen.

Programs presented this past year included the virtual Summer Reading Clubs for adults, teens,

tweens and children. Several authors participated in our virtual book discussions. We presented classical concerts through Zoom and Facebook Live. We provided patron favorites, such as yoga, meditation, Zumba, Zumba Gold, tai chi, knitting and crocheting, as well as craft programs.

We thank you for your continued

Our Financial Integrity


- The district has proposed a 2021-22 budget with no tax levy increase. In fact, it is a 0.12% decrease.
- The district's Standard & Poor's bond rating of AA is a rating earned by only a few of the districts in New York State.
- By refinancing outstanding bond payments, the district saved taxpayers \$6.5 million in interest
- Freeport spends approximately \$6,055 less per pupil and collects approximately \$11,080 less in tax levy per student than the average school district in Nassau County.
- \$24.2 million in capital projects completed using the capital reserve funds at no additional cost.
- \$6.3 million in districtwide improvements completed through an energy performance contract,
- lowered the carbon footprint by 30% annually, at no additional cost.
- \$5.9 million in projects completed through the SMART Schools Bond Act Program replaced four portable classrooms with permanent classrooms, infused technology into the classrooms including iPads, Chromebooks, Smart Boards and increased connectivity at no additional cost.


Grant Funding: More Than \$8 Million

To date, during the 2020-2021 school year, the district has been awarded more than \$8 million in competitive and allocated grant funding. These grants enable the district to provide additional essential programs and services at no cost to taxpayers.

VALUABLE PARTNERSHIPS

Advanced academic and research opportunities are available to students through partnerships the district has established with Adelphi University, Brookhaven National Laboratory, Cohen Children's Medical Center, Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory, Cradle of Aviation Museum, City University of New York, Farmingdale State College, the Graduate Center, Hofstra University, the International Association for Human Values, the Long Island Children's Museum, Molloy College, Nassau Community College, St. Louis College of Pharmacy, SUNY Old Westbury and Stony Brook University.

Freeport Public Schools has an ongoing partnership with Northwell Health's Cohen Children's Medical Center, which provides mental health support to children and adolescents between the ages of 5-17 who present with a mental health crisis.

OUR ACADEMICS

- The district has been selected, as one of five school districts in the nation, by the U.S. Education Department to participate in the CubeSat Project Challenge. Freeport High School students and J.W. Dodd Middle School students are designing a CubeSat that will carry an experiment for possible launch into outer space.
- Students participating in the CubeSat Project Challenge met via Zoom with astronaut Scott Tingle to discuss the design of their CubeSat and solicit feedback from him. This was the second

- time students had an opportunity to speak with him.
- 49 past and present students from Freeport High School earned the designation of Advanced Placement Scholars for excelling on the 2020 AP exams.
- 82 students will be inducted into Freeport High School's National Honor
- Society.
 81 students will be inducted into J.W. Dodd Middle School's National Junior Honor Society.
- Freeport teams representing Atkinson, Dodd and FHS participated in the 2021 virtual New York State Future Problem Solver State Bowl. Teams from all schools placed highly and have received an invitation to compete in the virtual International competition scheduled for **June**
- Caroline G. Atkinson Odyssey of the Mind fifth grade team, Division 1, placed first in the regional competition and second in the state-level competition. This team qualified to advance to the world finals. The sixth grade team, Division 2, placed second in
- the regional competition.

 Dodd Middle School Mathletes finished second out of the four New York schools and fifth out of the eleven schools in Region 2 competitions.

OUR SPORTS PROGRAMS

• Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, district athletes did not slow down. The district provided a Pre-Season Workout Program, open to all students in grades 7-12, to prepare for the fall and winter

sports seasons. The preseason training program offered socially distanced practice for girls and boys soccer, basketball, wrestling, girls tennis, cross-country, track and field, girls swim, golf, boys and girls volleyball, cheerleading and football in compliance with all New York State Education Department and New York State Department of Health Reopening Plan guidelines, as well as the current NYSPHSAA regulations. Several Freeport High School student-

athletes have been selected to Newsday's Top 100 Players in basketball, cheerleading, football and girls soccer.

OUR MUSIC AND ARTS PROGRAMS

- Once again, the district is a recipient of the Best Communities for Music Education Award by the NAMM Foundation for 2021
- Freeport High School Select Chorale performed at the Boston Celtics vs. the Washington Wizards basketball game, which aired on the NBC Sports Washington network.
- Two Freeport High School Select Chorale members were selected to participate in the 2020 New York State School Music Association Conference All-State Chorus. This is the highest level in the state a student-musician can
- Students at Caroline G. Atkinson School were joined during their music lesson by famous rock and roll guitarist and founder of the TeachRock Foundation Steven Van Zandt.
- Student-artists from the Leo F. Giblyn School had their artwork selected and

- displayed at the Long Island Children's
- Bayview's fourth grade orchestra and band students participated in The Harry Chapin Practice-A-Thon, an event happening across New York State, with a goal of raising \$20,000 to address food insecurity on Long Island.

Q. What is the capital reserve proposition, and why won't it impact school taxes?

A. The capital reserve proposition will have no effect on your taxes. In 2017, Freeport voters approved the creation of a capital reserve fund, which allows the district to set aside money in a reserve account specifically allocated for capital projects. With voter approval, the district will expend \$2.5 million from the 2017 capital reserve fund at no additional cost to taxpayers.

Q. What are the major factors impacting the proposed budget?

A. The proposed budget represents a budget-to-budget increase of 3.92% with no tax levy increase. This is the sixth out of seven years that the district has proposed a budget that results in a tax levy decrease. The proposed budget will maintain programs and services including current staffing needs, safety and security, special education/BOCES

tuition costs, transportation, technology upgrades and other mandated costs including COVID-19 costs for PPE and additional hygiene and sanitization supplies. The proposed budget also includes enhancements and provides support for loss of schooling during the school year including an expanded summer school program with academics, athletics, STEM and the arts, increased Social Emotional Learning programming and sensory spaces, funding for AP exams, support services for ENL and students with special needs, and increases professional development, curriculum development and materials focused on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Implicit Bias.

Q. How does the Federal American Rescue Plan (ARPA) impact the 2021-2022 budget? A. With the additional money allocated by the federal government to New York State

under ARPA, Freeport Schools saw an increase

in Foundation Aid. The ARPA funding is restricted for specific purposes. Freeport is granted an increase in Title grant funding under the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds, \$6.5 Million. The district is anticipating receiving additional ARPA funding of \$21.5 million and is awaiting further details regarding the use of these funds. The district will be required to spend these funds during the next four years.

Q. What happens if the proposed budget is not approved?

A. If the budget is not approved by voters, the Board of Education has the option of proposing the same budget or a revised budget for a revote. If the budget is defeated following the revote, the Board is required by law to adopt a contingency budget, which cannot increase the tax levy above the current year's amount. The proposed budget represents a 0.12% tax levy decrease.

What's on the Ballot?

PROPOSITION ONE: SCHOOL BUDGET

RESOLVED, that the School Expenditure Budget of \$195,649,933 be adopted and the necessary amount be raised by tax upon the taxable property located in Freeport Union Free School District, Town of Hempstead, Freeport, New York, for the year 2021-2022.

PROPOSITION TWO: FREEPORT MEMORIAL LIBRARY BUDGET

RESOLVED, that the Freeport Memorial Library Expenditure Budget amount of \$6,530,163 be adopted and the necessary amount be raised by tax upon the taxable property located in Freeport Union Free School District, Town of Hempstead, Freeport, New York, for the Freeport Memorial Library 2021-2022.

PROPOSITION THREE: CAPITAL RESERVE FUND

SHALL the Board of Education of the Freeport Union Free School District be authorized to expend: \$2,500,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund established on May 16, 2017 for the purpose of performing the following projects: roof replacement – Caroline G. Atkinson Intermediate School (Phase I) and Columbus Avenue Elementary School; masonry pointing and exterior glazed block repairs – Leo F. Giblyn Elementary School; replace Yankee Gutter System – Caroline G. Atkinson Intermediate School; HVAC improvements – districtwide; science rooms renovations – Freeport High School; school security upgrades/interior and exterior doors and hardware – districtwide; bathroom

and health office renovations – districtwide; air conditioning – districtwide; classroom/flooring lighting renovations – districtwide; ceiling tile and lighting replacements, window replacements, improvements to the grounds, steps, foundations, sidewalks, playgrounds, parking lots – districtwide; exterior improvements, field renovations – districtwide; renovate main entrance – Bayview Avenue Elementary School; replace gymnasium partition and wall pads – New Visions Elementary School.

Residents will be asked to vote on these propositions and the election of one trustee to the Board of Education.

Who Can Vote?

Only registered voters can participate in the Freeport School District budget vote. A qualified voter must be

- At least 18 years of age.
- A United States citizen.
- A resident of the Freeport School District for 30 days prior to the election.
- A duly registered voter.

Where to Vote

 Voting will be held at the following schools: Archer Street, Bayview Avenue, Caroline G. Atkinson, Columbus Avenue, Leo F. Giblyn and the Albany Avenue Field House.

Absentee Ballots

- Registered voters who require an absentee ballot may pick up an application at the district clerk's office or the Freeport Memorial Library. They may also call 516-867-5200 or 516-867-5209 to receive an application by mail.
- Applications for absentee ballots must be received by the district clerk at least seven days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter.
- If the ballot is to be filled out in the district clerk's office, voters have until the day before the election to pick up the ballots.

 Persons registered permanently disabled with the Nassau County Board of Elections will automatically receive an absentee ballot.

All ballots must be received by the district clerk by 5 p.m. on the day of the election.
